Lesson and Activity Suggestions for Kindergarten - 2nd grade

What a Plant Needs to Grow

Victory Gardens were fruit and vegetable gardens that Americans planted during a time when our soldiers were fighting in a big battle called World War II. During that time, food was in short supply, and Americans were asked to edible plants to make sure that families had healthy foods. Children planted Victory Gardens at their schools, adults planted Victory Gardens at their place of work, and no matter where they lived, in the city or in the country, families planted Victory Gardens together. When the fruits and vegetables were harvested, families, neighbors, and coworkers shared their harvest. Food could be eaten fresh or canned for later use in the winter. Everyone worked together, and everyone shared.

Your family has been given supplies to plant, tend, and grow fresh fruits and vegetables for your family to harvest, eat, and share, just like a Victory Garden! You will be learning about plants, how they grow, how to take care of them, and what to do with the harvest. Happy gardening!

A parent or older sibling can read this portion to the child to expose them to more challenging vocabulary and concepts — or just to learn more yourself.

The Victory Garden Program In December 1941, shortly after the United States entered World War II, Agriculture Secretary Claude Wickard began promoting Victory Gardens. The Department of Agriculture produced pamphlets to guide urban and suburban gardeners, magazines and newspapers published helpful articles, and patriotic posters urged participation. Neighborhood and community committees were formed with veteran gardeners guiding newcomers. These committees also helped with distribution of surplus food and sharing of equipment. Many garden tools were made of steel, which was in short supply, so sharing between families was encouraged.



There are four things that a plant must have if it is going to grow into a healthy fruit or vegetable. Do you know what they are?














What do plants need?

Color the picture. Plants need water, soil, air and sunlight to grow.




What do plants need to grow?

Color the pictures. Match each picture with the correct word




Circle 4 things that plants need to grow



What do plants need? Color the picture. Complete the picture with the needs below




What do plants need? Draw 4 things that plants need to grow. Color them


